In May of 2012, the office of the SUNY provost announced a new grant opportunity: the Innovative Instruction Technology Grants program, or IITG for short. This program aims to encourage and support the exploration of technology in teaching, and especially emphasizes partnership and collaboration.

Information Literacy Toolbook



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IL Fox Project Overview

Research the development of an online IL toolbook designed to provide:

- Information Literacy terminology, history, context, and applications
- Consistent access to a centralized enhanced information database
- An entry point into the world of experts affiliated with information literacy



Our project involved researching the development of an online information literacy toolbook containing two pedagogical elements – a dictionary of key terms from the information literacy curriculum, and a supporting encyclopedia page for each of these providing term history, overview, and other pertinent information.

What is Information Literacy?

Information Literacy is the set of skills needed to find, retrieve, analyze, and use information.

The beginning of the 21st century has been called the Information Age because of the explosion information sources. It has become increasingly clear that students cannot learn everything they study in a few years of college. Information literacy equips them with the critical skills necessary lifelong learners.

Too often we assume that as students write research papers and read textbooks they are gainin so. IL skills may be introduced but what is needed is a parallel curriculum in IL forming a strong education.

As the <u>American Library Association Presidential Committee on Information Literacy</u> (January 10 says "Ultimately, information literate people are those who have learned how to learn. They know know how knowledge is organized, how to find information, and how to use information in such a

For those unfamiliar with the term, Information Literacy is most often defined using the American Library Association's definition, which is: "A set of abilities requiring individuals to recognize when information is needed and have the ability to locate, evaluate, and use effectively the needed information."

From a comprehensive review of information literacy-related literature and organizations, over 2000 terms were selected for inclusion in IL Fox. These range from simple, static terms to more complex, dynamic ones. Terms that were identified as static were further coded by level of complexity.

Expert Identification



- Identified over 1700 experts for entry creation
- Looking for additional experts for entry creation and review

Most entries in IL Fox will be authored by experts in the field. We have identified more than 1700 information literacy experts for this who will be instrumental in the development of strong collaborations across campuses, SUNY Centers, and professional organizations. We are seeking additional collaborators, which is a large part of our being here today!

Assessment



- Developed pre/post assessments and usability tests
- Created materials for reviewers
- Will submit to PRIMO and MERLOT

To assess the effectiveness of IL Fox as a pedagogical resource, pre- and post-tests were developed, along with an instrument for usability testing. Outreach materials and criteria for content reviewers were also created. A further means of assessment will occur through submission of IL Fox to PRIMO and MERLOT for review.

Technical Aspects

- Determined technology needs
- Reviewed available software
- Created online forms and templates

Because IL Fox will be an online resource, there are many technical considerations. Preliminary research into these included determining the needs for a platform, reviewing available software for cost and flexibility, and defining maintenance issues and strategies. We also created online forms and templates for content creation and submission.

Outreach Materials

- Criteria for definition and entry creation
- Drafts of online forms for contact and submission
- Communication tools for soliciting and contacting collaborators
- Student assignment and related materials



Various outreach materials were developed, including criteria and online forms for definitions and entries. Communication and submission tools for authors and reviewers were drafted as well. We also created an assignment for LIS students to author static term content, and drafted communication tools for this.

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Collaborative Partnerships

This project is founded on partnership, beginning with a research team composed of a seasoned librarian, a library technology wizard, and a librarian quite new to the field. As mentioned, collaboration will also occur with experts, and LIS faculty and students. Additionally, we are seeking partnerships via listservs and conferences such as this one.



What's Next?

The IITG grant provided funding for one year. This supported a thorough research process that included consideration of multiple strategies for moving forward. Following these, implementation will occur in late 2013, with stages ranging from platform creation to content development and evaluation.

Create Platform

- Underlying architecture
- Customization
- Usability and accessibility



The initial task will be creating the platform, which will include a searching/browsing feature, listing of definitions, and structure for encyclopedia entries. After determining syntax, layout, and levels of interactivity, a working version will be created using human-computer interface design with a focus on usability and accessibility standards.

Author Entries/Definitions

- Expert authors

Experts we identified in the research phase will be contacted to create and upload entries for their assigned terms. Collaborative efforts will also be made with LIS faculty to engage students in creating content for static terms. By the end of the next phase of the project, a minimum of 500 key terms will contain definitions and entries and be available online.

Assessment/Usability

- Expert review board
- Usability testing
- Assessment



As term definitions and entries are finalized, reviewers enlisted during the research phase will evaluate these for accuracy, clarity and consistency. To gauge the success of the interface, usability testing will be conducted among University at Albany students. Additionally, pre- and post-tests will be used to assess the pedagogical strength of IL Fox.
